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Retro Leura: a guide

Leura village is dotted with white picket fences, a picnic strip lawn in the middle of the main drag, historic houses and quaint gardens that make for a veritable mid-century cocktail of charms. Local hotelier Lorraine Allanson has clocked countless hours in the local library archives researching the pasts of her gilded homesteads, and tells us where to tread a retro trail for a nostalgic Blue Mountains break

"This 13-acre living watercolour of flowers has enough pretty corners to feel like your own secret garden," says Allanson. "It's lovely whatever the season. The grotto pool is enchanting, but it's hard to beat the breathtaking views of the Jamison Valley.

Roam among the rhododendrons of one of the country's most admired heritage homes. Have scones in the Tea Rooms, a picnic (your own or one prepared in the kitchen), a look in at local art in the gallery that makes clever use of former squash courts, and a top-to-bottom recce of the main house The 1930s luxury weekend retreat of Belgian-born Sydney businessmar Henri van de Velde was a collaborative effort between its owner and Danishborn landscape designer Paul Sorensen. Two bathrooms are the flambovant exception to its pared-back modernism, the ground-level bathroom ablaze with burnt-orange glazed tiles.

Prime time to visit is October when the cherry blossoms are out in full force and the town swells with visitors to the Leura Gardens Festival (leuragardensfestival.com). The 50th anniversary of the event takes place this October 4-12

January hosts the outdoor Sport for Jove Theatre Co's Leura Shakespeare Festival, This year, the Artarmon-based thespians performed all fresco versions of Much Ado About Nothing and Cyrano de Bergerac. If visiting in winter (March-August) and are in a group of six to eight, consider booking the popular \$30-aead Sunday roast lunch, held in a private room adjoining the main dining floor, with a vista of the World Heritage Blue Mountains.



Allanson likes to keep an eve out for antique-inspired furniture and describes Leura's shopping strip as "packed with unique gifts in creative boutiques stocking products to rival Sydney and Melbourne's retail haunts."

Jodie Van De Velden's delectable Fair Trade Belgian couverture chocolates burst with natural fresh flavour infusions. The Lime & Basil creation is Josophan's award-winning signature offering, but there's a long list of addictive bestsellers: Honey Java Hive, Mint, Mayan Chilli, Peanut Butter Cups, dairy-free pralines, and big koalas. Children's favourites include White Ganache and the Blueberry Pyramid. There is a boutique, a workshop/tasting room and production laboratory where visitors and aspiring candy pullers get an insight into the chocolatier's workbench. 132 Leura Mall. Allanson: "Leura might be a retro-seeker's magnet, but that doesn't mean the dining scene is stuck in a time warp. The only thing old-fashioned, about the three-year-old Leura Garage is its honest approach to food and warm service. I love what they have done with this former auto-repair shop's modern and eco-aware fit-out, too."

Olives from Forbes, honey from Logan Brae on the Shipley Plateau, herbs and vegetables from Kanimbla Valley - The 100 Mile Diet is in good stead here, with pristine regional produce and wines from Orange and Mudgee on the menu steered by a young head chef who could not have a more apt name for a car-obsessed venue: Chevy McGrath. A stack of mufflers sitting high above the bar and automotive staff shirts lend a vintage appeal in a restaurant that aspires to the urban buzz and grunt of Melbourne's dining and cafe scene.

Pizza and 250g grain-fed Kilcoy scotch with salsa verde and beetroot crisps vie for regulars' favourite, while vegetarians will appreciate the deft simplicity of the mixed baby root and heirloom vegetables board, before leaving with a bottle of the popular pomegranate balsamic. Finish off a share plate night with dark crème caramel and a pour of Patina Sticky Tea Riesling.

Leuralla Toy & Railway Museum

Allanson, a busy mum to three boys, vouches for the town's attractions for families, such as Leuralla Toy & Railway Museum, the Southern Hemisphere's largest collection of toys, trains and associated memorabilia: "The museum is housed in an early 20th-century mansion and is literally packed with childhood treasures. But it's the gardens' Matterhorn Mountain Railway that is the highlight of any visit."



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
